On this 4th day of March 1834, personally appear before W. H. A. Drake, justice of the peace, in our for the county of Pendleton Alexander Gibson a resident of Bracklin county and state of Kentucky aged seventy eight years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated, that is to say. He entered the service of the United States as a substitute and a private some time in the year 1776 in the place of his father Andrew Gibson and under the command of John Lee Captain, Lieutenant Hugh White, and James White as Ensign and marched from the county of Northumberland and State of Pennsylvania to the State of New Jersey and was with General Washington during his retreat through said State and had one skirmish with the enemy. The troops to which this declarant was attached was sometimes detached from the main body and sometimes attached to the main body. He has a recollection that there was continental troops and officers with him but cannot say any thing particular about them.

as from infirmities of body old age and the consequent loss of memory he has forgot ~~many incidents~~ of the service but he recollects

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that he was to have served three months and was retained four months. He was stationed this campaign at different places but recollects the name of but one which he is called the 4th Divamp. there was a large Army with him and he has a rather indistinct recollection of the officers with him the Regiment to which he belonged was commanded by Col —

Potter, Washington was the Supreme command and he thinks at this time that there was Generals Greene and Wayne and many others along, but he cannot recollect all of their names at this distance of time. For this term he received in his own name, no discharge as it was in the name of his Father. In the year 1777 this declarant, say about June or July was drafted as a militia man still from the same county and state for the term of six months, and under the command of Captain John Landon. No other officer now recollects except Colonel Potter. This declarant does not now recollect to what general officers command he belonged, but he recollects General Washington Wayne Morgan Maxwell and Lay Haytle and the Maryland Troops and this declarant was at the battle of Brandywine at Chadds Ford and all persons acquainted with this town are in some sort acquainted with that battle. He served this time six months as a private this time he received a discharge signed by Captain John Landon. In the Spring of the Year 1779 this declarant was again ordered out under a draft under the command of Capt. Peter Ford, Lieutenant — Crozet, Ensign not now recollectable and he was stationed

during the season alternately at the Fort
 named Fort Montgomery, Fort Rice and Fort
 Ledyard all in the County of Chenango and
 State of Pennsylvania and served as a
 private for the term of six months by ranging
 from fort to fort and looking out for
 Indians signs and guarding said forts. He
 does not now recollect who his field officers
 was as there was but a Captain command
 with him. And in the year 1780 and about the
 last of February or first of March in said year
 as there was an unusual indication of depredations
 to be committed by the Indians, this declarant
 volunteered and marched under the command
 of Capt Thomas Robinson, Lieutenant Moses
 Simonds and Ensign James Chambers and
 was this year employed in the same names as
 last year and stationed at the same places.
 He knows of no other field officers than
 Potter who had in the meantime risen to
 the rank of General, he sometimes visited
 us this year. This declarant was himself
 in no battle. It was this year the practice to
 leave at each fort a commissioned officer
 with a few men while the others was a
 ranging except while one commissioned
 officer was passing from one fort to the
 other and while our Lieutenant was in this
 year passing from one fort to the other
 and ranging through the country with a
 few men he and his men was surprised in
 the night time by the Indians in a barn and
 all that was with him ^{except himself and four others} were killed, himself and
 the four ~~were taken~~ taken prisoners, and did not
 return for about two years the year that

declarant served as a private soldier eight months making in all two years as a private soldier. He was born in Cumberland county Penn-sylvania and on the 25th day of October 1795. He received his discharge from all of his captains setting forth the service above spoken of, except the time he was a substitute, but has lost or mislaid said discharges within 10 or 15 years. Since he has now no record of his age as it has been lost but it was in an old Bible. He removed with his Father from Cumberland county, Penn-sylvania the place where he was born to the county of Northumberland same state where he was about 12 years old and resided in said last place until the spring of the year 1790 when he again went to Cumberland county same state and remained one year when he removed to Washington county same state and there remained until the year 1801 when he removed to Scott county same state of Kentucky, and in the year 1808 he removed into Bracken county Kentucky where he has ever since resided and does now reside having lost or mislaid his discharges, he has no record evidence of his services nor does he know of any person now living with whose residence he has any knowledge by whom he can prove all or any part of his services. This declarant further states that he cannot without great pain to himself as well as the incurring of an expense which he is ill able to bear appear at and in open court to sign and swear to this his declaration the county seat of Bracken county is about fifteen miles from the residence of this declarant and the nearest Justice six miles

which is the reason of his going before a Justice
of Peace of Pendleton county so haring to go
but about one quarter of a mile to get before
a Justice of the peace in said county of Pendleton.
He refers to Theodoreis Matthews and George Green
of Brackin county and both near Neighbors to
this declarant and Clergyman of the Methodist
persuasion. Having now stated all of the particulars
of his services as well as he can now recollect he
repeats that owing to infirmities of his body old
age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot
recollect all, but says that served as a private
soldier in the year 1776 not less than four months,
in the year 1777 not less than six months, in
the year 1779 not less than six months and in the
Year 1780 not less than eight months as stated
before and all the time a private in the Militia
of Pennsylvania.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present and
declares that his name is not on the pension Roll
of the agency of any state or Territory whatever.
