State of Kentucky, Pendleton County &c.

Be it remembered that among the records and proceedings of the Pendleton County Court at their September Term A.D. 1832, in the following to wit:

State of Kentucky - Pendleton County &c.  
 On this 17<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832, personally appeared in open Court, before the Justice of the County Court now sitting, William Latimer, a resident of S<sup>c</sup> County of Pendleton & State of Kentucky, aged seventy years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to attain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed 7<sup>th</sup> day of June 1832. That he entered the Militia in service of the United States, as a Volunteer, under the following named Officers, and served as a hero in stated: He entered the service under a Capt. Tho<sup>s</sup> Threadcill, in the County of Brunswick and State of Virginia, on the 12<sup>th</sup> Oct. 1779, for eight months, and served out his time, and was discharged at the Redhouse on Pameter river - he does not recollect whether in the State of Virginia or North Carolina, but he thinks nearly on the line between the two States. He does not recollect the different field officers he was under, as they were so frequently changed from Regiment <sup>to Regiment</sup>, with he recollects that the most of his time he was attached to a Regiment commanded by Col. Elijah: He was in no battle. He marched through North Carolina into South Carolina under Genl. Groen, but does not recollect the different Counties he passed through. He received an honorable discharge at the Red house, on Pameter river (as heretofore stated) which he has lost. In the year 1780 he was drafted in the Militia in S<sup>c</sup> County of Brunswick for three months - and was discharged about six miles north of Richmond in Virginia, at a place called the Longbridge: He was attached to the company of Capt. Lawrence Howe: The field officers were Majr. Halcomb, Colo. St. George Tucker and Genl. Lawson. From the great lapse of time, he does not recollect the different Counties he marched through. That he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his services.  
 I hereby relinquish every claim what ever to a pension or annuity, except the present and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State in the

"We Jesse Robinson, a Clergyman, residing in the  
"County of Grant, and John Redmhour, residing  
"in the same, hereby certify, that we are  
"well acquainted with William Latimer  
"who has subscribed and sworn to the above  
"declaration, that we believe him to be  
"seventy years of age; that he is reputed  
"and believed in the neighbourhood where  
"he resides to have been a soldier of the  
"Revolution, and that we concur in that  
"opinion. Sworn to & subscribed the day  
"and year aforesaid?  
"Jesse Robinson.  
"John Redmhour."

"And the said court do hereby declare  
"their opinion, after the investigation of  
"the matter; and after putting the interroga-  
"tories prescribed by the War Department  
"that the above named applicant was a  
"Revolutionary soldier and served as he  
"states. And the court further certifies  
"that it appears to them that Jesse Robinson  
"who has signed the preceding certifi-  
"cate is a Clergyman, residing in the  
"County of Grant, in this State; and that  
"John Redmhour who has also signed  
"the same is a resident of the same  
"County & State, and is a credible person  
"and that their statement is entitled to credit."



Elizabeth Lattimore of said County aged 62 years being sworn says she is the widow of William Lattimore deceased who was in his lifetime a Revolutionary Pensioner of the United States in the Kentucky Agency at the rate of about twenty eight dollars per year (as well as the annuities) and who died in said County on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of March A.D. 1833 leaving the said Elizabeth his widow who yet survives him and has not since married but still remains widow and resides in said County.

She further states that she was married to the said William Lattimore on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of November A.D. 1815 in said County by one — Manroe a preacher that her name before marriage was Elizabeth Hollady.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the arrears of pay or pension money to which she may be entitled to ~~as the~~ as the widow of the aforesaid William Lattimore deceased under any act or acts resolution or resolutions of the Congress of the United States.

Madam:

I have to advise you, that from the papers in the pension claim, W. 26192, it appears that William Latimer enlisted in Brunswick County, Virginia on October 12, 1779, and served eight months, as a private in Captain Thomas Threadgill's Company, Colonel Glenn's Virginia Regiment.

He enlisted in 1780 and served three months in Captain Lawrence House's Company, Colonel Saint George Tucker's Virginia Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 18, 1833, while living in Pendleton County, Kentucky, aged seventy years. He died in Harrison County, Kentucky, March 24, 1838.

He married in Scott County, Kentucky, November 12, 1815, Elizabeth Holliday and she was allowed pension on her application executed November 17, 1855, while living in Harrison County, Kentucky, aged sixty-four years.
