On this 1st day of April 1833 personally appears in open court before the Justices of the County Court of Pendleton now sitting James Pribble a resident of Pendleton County and State of Kentucky aged seventy one years, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the acts of Congress, passed June the 7th 1832.

That he entered the Service of the United States under the following names, officers, and served as hereinafter stated. He entered the Service in the month of March in the year 1791 as a substitute for Stephen Pribble (his father) under the command of Colonel William Crawford and Major Thomas Hughes in their field offices now recollected. His Company Officers were Captain Jasper Pymon, Lieutenant Joseph Hammett and Ensign Charles Swan and marched to Arkansas Fort or Garrison on Ten Miles Creek in Washington County and State of Pennsylvania (he was at that time residing in Taylor County and State) and remained at Lewis Fort as head quarters and performing Militia duty for the term of six months there was this year two troops at the Fort except the company to which he belonged and their business was to guard the Fort and occasionally as the commanding officer (who was Col. Crawford) thought proper to order out detachments to range through the country along the line of Settlements.

to prevent the Indians who was said and believed
to be in alliance with the British army from
entering the settlements, Washington county
Pennsylvania being at this time a frontier
county all the male white persons over sixteen
years and under forty five years of age was
held as minute men in the Militia of this
of the State and held ready to march at
a moments warning and so continued until
the close of the Revolutionary war. Besides
at the same time there was a portion of
the minute men so held to serve regularly
each year detailed to go and guard the
different Forts, Block-houses and Stations
whereas was fixed along the whole frontier
to prevent the Indians in alliance with
the British from entering the settlements
committing waste and other savage acts
and crossing the mountains and in-
vading the American army which
was acting against the British army.
The officers usually called on the minute
men generally to furnish as many volunteers
to guard the Forts, &c. and range the
country as would volunteer when it was
necessary to march to the Forts and after
all who would volunteer had done so if
there was not the number wanting they
would then make up the balance by
drawing lots or draft. A large portion
of young men would volunteer that the men
of families might remain at home and
raised ~~troops~~ for up at any time there
was an alarm such as to invade the

This year we were frequently ordered to retreat when we were in small detachments and when we were in the neighbourhood of the Indians and they known to us to be the strongest forces and when we were to retreat we would send out runners to inform other detachments of our condition and we would be reinforced when the Indians would turn retreat. This year he served at least five months he believes more but he knows that he did serve as much as 5 months. In the year of 1780 he was still here all the year as before a minute man ready to march at moments warning besides the same office as last year. But does not recollect that he was called on in all the year if he was it was for to shoot a time that he has forgot.

In the month of March and in the year 1781 he was together with one Gabriel Calkins detailed (with their consent) and ordered out by Colonel William Crawford ~~and~~ the Colonel who commanded the Regiment to which they belonged and they served as a spy traversing the wilderness a long the line of frontier and looking out for Indians and Indian signs and when they saw either it was their business to retreat or fast as they could and give information what some of the posts where there was troops stationed or to some office of Militia or some detachment out on duty so that arrangement could be made to prevent a surprise. He was frequently during his service as a spy

his new Regiment and some time in the
month of March he was called out into the service
and marched under the auspices of the Army
to and made the same Fort our General rendezvous
from which Fort he was ordered out in detach-
ments the range along the frontier between
the month of December until the same place
heretofore spoken of and Fort Moberly on the
Ohio River. He was most of his time this year
engaged in moving backwards and forwards
between the aforesaid points and frequently met
with detachments of men from the aforesaid Fort
which was about four or five miles from
Ankams Fort and also on ten mile creek
and in Washington County and whenever
they so met we some times marched together
a day or two. This year he was Second
Sergeant and Alexander Monroe (for many
years since a preacher of the Gospel in the
Baptist Church) was first Sergeant he
having at this declarant believes previously
served in the Regular Army below the mountains
The same Monroe some years ago obtained
a pension and resided in this county and
State but about four years since removed
to the State of Indiana the part of said State
not known to this declarant nor whether he
yet lives or not at any rate the distance
and the age of them both renders it im-
possible to procure his evidence. He this
year was in actual service at least
five months he believes more and indeed
he believes he served a longer term each
year than he has put it down at but had
rather fit it below than to them stretch
to beyond it. He as before states that

served ~~seven~~ months as a substitute and arrived
at the age of sixteen years in January 1778 and
was immediately put on the Militia roll and
from that time until the close of the Revolu-
tionary war was held to Militia duty
and in readiness to march at any moment
warning. This time he was thus held in
readiness and at the same time he was in service
was at least four years and six months
and he was in actual service and
on duty as before stated at least two
years and four months he believes more
but he knows that he was on duty that
long. He was at no time during his service
in company with all of the Regiment to
which he belonged but was all the
times in service with only one company
the other companies were his supports
stationed at other Forts or Stations or block
houses on the frontier with the field officers
which he does not know with some of them
he knows that the field officers who was
with him frequently by turns left him
for (as it was said) other posts. He does not
know the name of either of the two Regiments
to which he at different times belonged
but has named the commanders of them
both. He knows that himself and those
with him were called Pennsylvania Militia
~~He has no recollection of any other Militia except~~
those with him and Captain James Archibald
and Lieutenant Thomas Brachear who was
stationed at Jackson's Fort before spoken of
He was in no battles in all his service ~~and~~

but there was frequently persons killed in the
neighbourhood of the forts at which he was and
also near Jackson's Fort. The Government of
of Pennsylvania during the service of the
frontier Militia of more importance on
the frontier than in the ^{part} ~~part~~ of the settled
part of the country. Drew confined all
their operations to the frontier the consequence
was that although he heard of all the most
distinguished regular General Officers
and many of the continental Regiments
yet he never was in service in com-
-pany with any of them either Officers
or Regiments and states that he knew
none of them. He thinks that he received
a written certificate of all ^{or most of} the Captains under
whom he served except Captain Thomas
Hughes who gave him a written discha-
-rge signed by himself and perhaps
counter signed by Colonel William ~~William~~
McClary. He is not positive that he
received certificates of service from all
his Captains but knows he did from
some of them and believes from all with
the discharge of persons and he care-
-fully preserved them all until in
the month of March or a year 1797
or 1798 he did not be certain which
year it was but it was one of them
and while he lived in Berks County
Pennsylvania his house was consumed by
fire and all such papers consumed in
the house with many other articles.

9 He has therefore no recollection of his services. He was born on the 8th day of January 1762 in the county of Baltimore and State of Maryland and removed while a boy (his age he does not now know) with his father Stephen Prible to the county of Washington and State of Pennsylvania and resided there during all his senior service and until December 1789 when he removed to Bourbon county and State of Kentucky and resided there about three years and moved to Fayette county same State lived there two years then he moved to what is now Boone county (then it was Masons county) and settled at a station where the bridge now stands and county seat of Boone county and resided within the present bounds of Boone county about 20 or 24 years the time not exactly recollected when he removed to the adjoining county of Pendleton county the same in which he now resides and has resided about fifteen or more years. He has a record of his age in an old Bible now at his own house. Alexander Monroe having removed as before stated and the situation of the deponent and said Monroe being as before stated he does not now know of any living person or persons by whom he can prove

all or any part of his services whose evidence
he can make arrangements to get except
Gabriel Calkins whose deposition was taken in
Bradken county on the 11th day of March 1833
(proving a great part of the evidence of this declaration)
and as certified by a justice of the peace and

Calkins faces age and infirmities of body being
unable to attend at this court (which said

Be it known that on this 9th day of September 1852 personally appeared before me Julius V. Thomas a justice of the peace and for said County Margaret Prebble a resident of said County aged ninety two years who being duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Act of Congress passed the 29th day of July 1848. That she is the widow of James Prebble who was a private Sergeant in the Army of the Revolution and who was pensioned for his services on the 7th of May 1833 but on the said behalf service performed and offers and exhibits in support thereof his declaration and proof in support thereof filed in the Office of the War Department.

She further declares that she was married to the said James Prebble on the 15th day of May 1783 in Washington County Pennsylvania. That her husband the aforesaid James Prebble died on the 21st day of June 1851. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the 2nd day of January ¹⁸⁴⁰ at the time aforesaid. She further swears that she is now a widow and that she has never made any application for a pension before.

Dear Madam:

The data which follow were taken from papers on file in the pension claim, W. 3595, based on the Revolutionary War service of James Pribble.

James Pribble, the son of Stephen, was born January 8, 1762, in Baltimore County, Maryland, and moved, when a boy, with his father to Washington County, Pennsylvania. His mother's name and the dates and places of birth of his parents are not shown.

While residing in Ten Mile Settlement on the Monongahela River in Washington County, Pennsylvania, he enlisted and served as follows: from March, 1777, six months as a substitute for his father and was a private in Captain Jesse Pignan's company in Colonel William Crawford's regiment; from March, 1778, six months as private in Captain Jesse Pignan's company in Colonel William Crawford's regiment; from March, 1779, five months as substitute for his father, as private in Captain Joseph Vanneter's company; from March, 1781, six months as an Indian spy under Colonel William Crawford; from March, 1782, five months as second sergeant in Captain Thomas Hughes' company in Colonel William McClary's regiment.

In December, 1789, James Pribble moved to Bourbon County, Kentucky, lived there about three years, then moved to Fayette County, Kentucky, and lived two years, then moved to Mason (later Bracken) County, Kentucky, and settled "at a station where Augusta now (in 1833) stands," where he lived twenty or twenty four years, then moved to Pendleton County, Kentucky.

James Pribble was allowed pension on his application executed April 1, 1833, while living in Pendleton County, Kentucky.

He died June 4, 1851, in Pendleton County, Kentucky.

This soldier married May 15, 1783, in Washington County, Pennsylvania, Margaret Pribble or Prebble, no relationship shown.

She was allowed pension on her application executed September 9, 1852, at which time she was aged ninety two years and resided in Pendleton County, Kentucky. In 1855 she was living in Pendleton County.

A son was referred to in 1849 but his name and age were not given.

The names of the parents of the widow, Margaret, are not shown.

In 1838, one Job Pribbel stated that he was present at the marriage of James and Margaret Pribble in 1783, relationship not shown.

The papers in this claim contain no further data relative to soldier's family.
