On this the 19th day of Oct 1879 before me the Subscriber one of the Circuit Judges for the Commonwealth of Ky personally appeared Henry Myatt aged 66 years resident of Pendleton County and State of Ky who being by me first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provisions made by Congress in an act ^{entitled an act} for an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war —

That he the said Henry Myatt was drafted into the service of the United States at the Court house in King & Queen County Virginia in the month of March in the year 1777 and was attached to the 7th Virginia Regiment Commanded by Col. Heath of the Continental line and served in the company of said Regiment commanded by Capt Thomas Rice and served in said Regiment & company for the term of twelve months being the whole time for which he was drafted and obtained an honorable discharge from service and that he was in the battle of Monmouth

and that he is in Obedient circumstances and needs the assistance of his Country for his support and that he made his application ^{about 1 year ago} about 1 year ago Sworn to and declared before me this the day above written

On this first day of November 1837 personally appeared before me Charles Martin a Justice of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid Elizabeth Wyate Widow and Relict of Henry Wyatt, dec'd a resident of 5th County of State aged about _____ years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth, on her oath make the following Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed July the 4th 1836. That she is the Widow of Henry Wyatt dec'd who was a private in the Revolution for the proof of his enlistment and service ^{and discharge} ~~and discharge~~ ^{and discharge} is requested to be had to such documentary evidence as may be found upon record in the Office of the War Department. She further declares that she was married to the s^d Henry Wyate as near as she can come at the time by counting the ages of her children in the year 1780 or 81 in Spottsylvania County and State Virginia by Person Rinn Church Minister. That from many circumstances now fresh in her recollection she thinks that her Marriage to her s^d Husband must have taken place before his service ended in the Revolution she recollects well that he was absent from Home several times for a considerable length of time and that during his absence from Home he employed his brother to attend to his business and manage his affairs at Home she always understood that he was in the United States Service. In moving to this Country they lost their Bible in which were registered their Marriage Age and birth of her children so that she cannot rely with certainty upon her Memory in giving her age; but she thinks that she is largely upwards of 70 years of age That her oldest son Elodia Wyate (who now lives some where in the State of Indiana) is some where about 54 or 55 years of age and that he

he was born precisely nine months after his marriage
with his 1st Husband that his 1st Husband died in
1832 that anterior to his death he obtained a pension
as she is informed under the Act of 1818 and that his
pension was afterwards suspended for some cause
unknown to her. She further states that she has
remained a widow ever since the death of the
aforesaid Henry Myatt. She further states that she has
had by her 1st Husband seven Children (to wit)
Mordica, Permelia, Larnus, Philip, Pectay, Henry
Nancy, & Agnes, Permelia, John & Sally that her
daughter Permelia was born two years and
six months after the birth of Mordica she does
not recollect precisely the difference between the
ages of her other children.

to this country they lost their only Bible
in which were registered their marriage
and birth of himself and other children
which they then had. He further states
that his father died some time in
the year 1822 and that his mother
has remained a Widow ever since.

I do hereby certify that I became acquainted with Henry Wyatt and married his eldest son in the year 1803 or 4. This affair was then informed by the s^r Henry Wyatt that his son Elodia had spent his apprenticeship to the brick laying business and that he was of age to do business for himself. This Elodia afterwards became well acquainted with the whole family, and after the death of Henry Wyatt administered upon his estate at the request of the family, and also entered as Guardian for some of the Children. Henry Wyatt left a Widow (now) Elizabeth and eleven Children as mentioned by s^r Elizabeth in her Declaration. He does not know the ages of the Children as none of them could give him any correct information about their ages. He however recollects distinctly when he first became acquainted with Henry Wyatt and his son Elodia which was as above stated. Mrs Wyatt the Widow and relict of Henry de^s is now living and has remained a Widow ever since the death of her Husband. She maintains a good character for truth and honesty as well as the whole family, and has no doubt that her statements about her Marriage may be relied upon as strictly true so far as she makes them from her own knowledge. She (Elizabeth)

is at this time quite infirm and
has the appearance of a very aged
lady. This affiant ~~states~~ further
states that in sitting with John
Myatt the youngest heir he had to
ascertain his age by that of a doctor
counting him at 21 years when he
first became acquainted with him

Summers, a Justice of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid Emanuel Wgate a Resident of said County, of lawful age and first duly sworn according to Law, Deposition That he was well acquainted with Henry Wgate, and Elizabeth his wife both before and after their Marriage, that the said Henry was his (Deponents) Uncle and the said Elizabeth, is his (Deponents) Wifes Sister, that he has a perfect recollection of the Marriage of his said Uncle Henry Wgate, to the said Elizabeth, that the Marriage took place in Spotsylvania County in the State of Virginia, in the year 1787 what time in the year he does not certainly recollect. He further states that his Ancestry is descended from his family name, which was taken from his Fathers Bible, that he well recollects they were married the same year that his (Deponents) Mother Turner Wgate, was born, ^{which was} in the year 1787, and at that time they all resided in the State of Virginia.

He further states, that the said Elizabeth
Wyatt now resides in the County of
Purditon Kentucky, and that her hus-
band Henry Wyatt die, departed this
life in said County of Purditon, where
his Widow has ever since resided, and
that she has not married since his
death.

Madam:

I have to advise you that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 836, that HENRY WYATT enlisted in King and Queen County, Virginia, in 1777 and served one year as a private in Captain Thomas Hill's Company in Colonel Heth's Virginia Regiment and he was in the battle of Monmouth.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 19, 1818, at which time he was sixty-six years of age and was a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky.

He died December 27, 1823.

He married in 1787 in Spottsylvania County, Virginia, Elizabeth Redd. She was allowed pension on her application executed November 1, 1837, while a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky, and at that time she was over seventy years of age.

Henry and Elizabeth Wyatt had the following children: Mordecai who was the eldest, Parnellia, James, Philip, Betsy, Henry, Nancy, Agnes, Beverly, John and Sally.
