John Gambrill estate also owed decedents estate a debt of some amount which they charge plff has collected or ought to have collected and they charge that decedent also at and just before the time of his death had a large amount of money which the defendant Richard Herald got wothout any right to do so & which he has never accounted or amounting to about \$2000, as they are advised & charge & they ask and claim judgment against him for said sum & for all other sums property and amounts which he got from decedent & charge that he never paid decedent any thing for what he got of decedent they tharge that Deft Richard got from Decedent & kept of Decedents personal property goods effects household furniture & a great amount which he never paid or accounted for of the value of at least \$500 & they ask judgment over against him for same. They charge that Defendant Richard lived on said Alexander Heralds home tract of land in this county & used & cultivated same for about 20 years last past and never paid anything therefore & still ows the same to decedents estate amounting in value to at least \$2000 & used & destroyed vast amounts of lumber on said land & they ask judgment against him for same & they charge that just before the death of decedent and a very short time before decedents death and when decedent was very old frail infirm & feeble in body & mind in so much that he was not capable in law to manage and dispose of his own business & estate and whe deft Richard was living with him the Defendant Richard thereby his over persuasion deception & undue influence over decedent caused decedent to attempt to convey to him said decedent said home tract of land of which decedent was the owner for some pretended consideration which was not genuine & which was never paid said home tract of land lying at upon & around thee mouth of Puncheon Camp Creek in said County & being now worth at least \$3500, & said Deed was wrongfully unlawfully & fraudently obtained from decedent by Deft Richard Herald for the purpose of wronging and defrauding the others of Decedents children and heirs out of same & to impoverish & ruin them & without their wills or consents & had said Deed secretly & clandestinely made & these Defts never had any knowledge that said Deed was made & fraud committed until whithin less than five years now last past & never did see the Deed if there be any such but they learn Deft Richard claims to have got such Deed they ask that said Deed if there be any be cancelled annulled & held for nought & that said land be partitioned & decided between the said children & heirs of Decedent & if this cannot be done they ask that Deft Richard be compelled to pay the value of said land to said heirs to be distributed among them on Equitable pincples they charge that Decedent had at the time of his death other lands which he had not deeded away or disposed adjoining his said home tract and also on the South side of the MiddleFork of the Kentucky River opposite said Home Tract and the defendant Harrison Herald is now setting up some kind of pretended claim to said land on the south side of said River but which is not a genuine claim & that said Deft Harrison claims to hold said land under a pretended gift or executong parol contract which he claims he made with decedent & claims that decedent never made him a conveyance to same & they charged that decedent never did make him any conveyance to same & that he never paid decedent anything for same that he entered on same under decedent merely as his tenant & has

Also the deposition of Elijah Bowling taken at the same time & place and for the same purpose. Witness being of lawful age and first duly sworn says -

I am 50 years old and reside (in) Breathitt County Ky - By occupation a farmer.

I paid the note that was executed to J. B. Hargis & Mc Daniel from myself to John Deaton Sr. an (on) James Dickson who were officers at that time the note being put in their hands for collection by Wiley Amis. My recollection is that Davil McDaniel let Brawner have the note spoken of for collection-

the exact amount of said note, I do not now remember or the date of same. I think I have the receipt for the note spoken of from Deaton & Dickson for the payment of same, which was collected by them If ever Wily Amis got this money I do not know it. That I paid to Dickson and Deaton the part of the note that I paid to Dickson I tried to hang that part of it up, and I did not succeed in doing so from the fact I could not make the proof that Elisha Bowlin paid the same to Wils Calahan. This suit was before James Stidham who was a Justice of the Peace at that time. Wils Calahan was present at the trial of the case spoken of & it is my recollection in that Wily Amis was present at the trial also prosecuting the same.

I think the war was closed when I (laid) the note spoken of my reccollection is that it has been about eight or nine years ago since I paid the note to Dickson. Wils Calahan was an officer at the time spoken of this being the only interest he had for prosecuting the note spoken of before James Stidham a Justice of the Peace.

I do not reccollect that James Dickson was an officer in 1869.

And further sayth not.

Elijah Boling

Also the deposition of Daniel McDaniel taken at the same time & place and for the same purpose. I am forty two years old and reside in Breathitt County Ky. Am a school teacher by occupation.

About the close of the war or after as near as I can reccollect it was about 67 or 8. Wiley Amis got fifty dollars on the Brawner debts from John Guinns wife. He Amis also got the Preston Combs debts and Wily Amis stated to me that he had collected about twenty five or thirty dollars from John Amis and he also stated that this money was collected on the Brawner Debts. He Amis also stated that it was his reccollection that John Amis paid the amount spoken of for some of the parties that owed the Brawner debt.

I did not to my recollection let Brawner have a debt on John Amis. Wiley Amis also stated to me that he got the Joe Rawly debt which was transfered to Brawner also whic was one of the Brawner debts.

And further deponent sayth not.

Daniel McDaniel

Also the deposition of Wiley Amis taken at the same time and place and for the same purpose. Witness being of lawful age and first duly sworn. Says -

I am 66 yres of age and reside in Breathitt County Ky. By occupation a farmer. I am the Plff in this Action.

When I came back from Canses in 1875 in the spring, John S. Hargis had been lawing me for a number of years about the Brawner debts that were in my hands for collection. I went to Jackson Ky. and I settled this matter with John B. Hargis on two hundred and seventy five dollars as being collected by me of Brawners money. The money he Hargis was sueing me for and I was to retain out of the \$275 - 15 pct on the dollar for my commission for collecting the same which was promised me by H. F. Hensley, Brawners Atty. Hargis was to take a not for the payment of this money - that is the \$275 spoken of. I told said Hargis that I thought the note was large enought to pay the debt if not (our) do it. But I had not saw the note that Hargis was to take for a number of years. On my part I was to come to the Middle fork to J. T. Johnsons to get said note and when he came I got the note. I saw that it would over pay the \$275 dollars as agreed on and told him if he collected the note he would owe me some and I want your receit for the same. He told me to get him ink and paper and he Hargis would give me one. I got the paper and ink for him. He wrote me a recept and gave it to me and I gave him up the note that he was to have. He told me he has collected the note and interest which when calculated up if no mistake in the calculation Amounts to \$369 and some cence which leave Mr Hargis due me agreeable tothe settlement one hundred & thirty six dollars and some cence. I demanded this money from him and he will not pay me.

By Defendant

My best recollection is that I collected \$275 of the Brawner debts. If I collected a note on Henry Turner I do not know it. If I collected a debt on Samuel Turner I do not know it. I do not recolect that I collected a note on J. C. Strong. I think I got all the money that Stidham & Deaton Collected for me.

And further sayth not.

Wilie Amis

I am 33 years of age I reside in Breathitt County Ky. Am a farmer by occupation.

According to my understanding this suit spoken of was settled. Amis agreed to pay John B. I herd the plff demand the money of Hargis - he refused to pay same to plff this being the over of what he Amis was to pay him, which is \$153.25 By deft.

The matter that is in controversy between Hargis & Amis is the over plus of the Alferd Amis note., dbt and interest aftery paying Hargis the amount agreed upon.

I do not that Dicson or any other officer ever paid Wiley Amis any money. And further sayth not.

Witness claims his attendance.

Also the deposition of Thomas Herald taken at the same time and place and for the same purpose. Witness being of lawful age and first duly sworn says.

I am 66, of age and reside in Breathitt County am a farmer by occupation.

I think their was a judgement render in Spicers Court. The judgement I speak of was recorded in Brawners favor vs. William Garber. And by virture of my office as Justice of the Peace of Breathitt County, I as such issued an Execution on same. And as to whether the execution I speak of was ever returned I know not. There was a jury claimed and as to who clamed the jury I know not. And the Jury by there judgement takenece the property that was leavied on from the Execution. I do not know who claimed the property and Wiley Amis paid me my cost. I do not remember of issuing an other Execution nor of receiving one

The buisines I speak of was transacted by Willson Calahan. I do not know that wills Calahan collected the money on the execution I speak of if he did he did not do it on our execution. He Calahan might have collected the execution before same run out. I did not stay with Amis all the time Calahan migh have collected the money off of Farber and paid same to Amis.

On this 10th day of December 1832 personally appeared in the open court before the Justices of the County Court of Perry County now sitting, Roger Turner, a resident of the County and State aforesaid, age seventy four years, who first being sworn according to law, does on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under Captain Jess Walton, Lieutenant Benjamin Cleveland and Ensign William Nall, and served six months under them, but the name of the Colonel is not recollected. The name however, of the Colonel of the County of Surry was - Armstrong - that the firs meeting of the company was at Hamblin's old store, about 12 or 15 miles from where Wilks Court House now is, and 30 miles from Surray Court House in the State of North Carolina.

The company of Capt. Walton in chich I served was the first company of Volunteers in the County of Surray after meeting at Hamblin's Old Store, they marched to Salisbury, shortly after they were called to Cross Creek against the Scotch, that before this company reached there, the battle was over and this company stayed some time and guarded the Scotch prisoners and then started to Wilmington with the prisoners and was relieved by the Light Horse; from that time they were engaged in scouring the country in search of other Tories on to the County of Surray again; the tour of six months having expired the company was discharged at the P. Hamblin Old Store - that his residence at the time was in the said county of Surray, North Carolina; being young at the time he cannot state the year only from calculating back it was however sometime after the commencement of the war.

That he again served a tour under Captain Joseph Herndon, Lieutenant William Lenoir, and Ensign Nathan Flourney as a volunteer. That the company first met where Wilkes Courthouse now is and was marched to Owen's on Reddy's River and there stationed to guard the settlement against the indians. Colonel Armstrong commanded the regiment to which Captain Herndon's company belonged, as he now believes. The tour of service was, as he now believes, at sixty days, but a certainty he cannot say.

That the fall after he again entered the service at the same place as before under Captain Benjamin Cleveland, Lieutenant William Lenoir, and Ensign Nathan Flourney and was marched to the Catawba River to a place called the Pleasant Garden after the Cherokee indians. At which place he was taken sick and was for some time confined as he supposed on his death bed, but was sent hom by John Greer, where he recovered.

At the expiration of this tour, which was for three months, he met at White's Bottom, on the Yadkin River, where the company was discharged and he was discharged also. He states that he got a discharge at the end of each tour, but not thinking it worthwhile to take care of them, they all have been lost.

That afterwards he served two tours of about two weeks each under Captain Richard Allen and Lieutenant Larkin Cleveland and in search of the Tories of New River, when Zachariah Goss was catched and hung on Captain Coxe's Gate. That Colonel Armstrong commanded the regiment to which Captain Cleveland's company belonged when he was taken sick. Ruthorford Griffith was the General. At the time of the two trips to New River Benjamin Cleveland was the Colonel.

That he afterwards served under Captain John Cleveland and Lieutenant William Reynolds. Theey met on the Yadkin River and marched from there to Guilford but before they got there the Battle of Guilford Court-house was over. That they were some time detained there in scouting after the tories, then returned home. The tour was at least one month.

Shortly after three was a call for men to go to the Haw River, at the High Rock Ford, after Fanning, who was a notorious man as heading the tories. That he volunteered and went on that tour. Soon after they got there the samllpox broke out among the soldiers and they were sent home. The tour was at least one month.

He afterwards served with Colonel Benjamin Cleveland and Captain Richard Allen a tour of three months. The company first met at Wilkes Court-house, Wilkes being a new County, and was detained there severaldays before enough men could be raised to go on. They then marched to South Carolina, on the way to King's Mountain, but the battle was over before they got there, they being on foot. They met the prisoners at the Cherokee Ford on Broad River where they took charge of the prisoners and took them to the Moravian Town back in North Carolina, at which place the company again was discharged.

That he afterwards was drafted for three months and started from Wilkes County under Major Benjamin Horne and Lieutenant William Reynolds. They met first at Major Lewis' and were marched to the Trading Ford on the Yadkin River at which place they were discharged. He further states that he was frequently called on and Served several days at a time after the tories, amounting to about 20 days.

In addition to his own services he paid the 15th part of two eighteen month tour as substitutes hired by his class of 15.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.

Last week, an old newspaper article was sent in the mail to my mother, Armina Herald Walker. A relative in Newport (Jalia Stamper) had heard through the 'grapevine' that Albert Herald had gone to 'The Buzzard Rock' along with a couple of 'crazy' cousins. So, this story is one I think many of your readers will be interested in.

The article was titled 'Up The Creek', written by Jason Hall and printed in the Jackson Times in the summer of 1994. I chuckled as I read it. Here were five hearty, young men who set out on a trek to the 'legendary buzzard rock'. They entered the rail from Josie Turner's on Turner's Creek. These men also believed the last time anyone had seen Buzzard Rock was years ago (in the 1980's!), when two members of their party had actually gone there. Buzzard Rock was held in their memories to be a grand chunk of rock about 100 fect by 100 feet high. They also took pictures of the historic journey.

Our story reads like this:

On a picture perfect day of a made to order perfect week of weather- Albert Herald, of Newport, agreed to bet the 'scourt' and lead harley Bowling and myself to the 'top of Buzzard Rock.' You see, as Henley Turner said - Albert would be one of only a few people who could get you up there and back and really know where he was at!

We began our "pilgrimmage" very naive. I tied my bandana around my head, grabbed my snake stick, machette, one bottle of water, three mints, a denim back-pack and we were off, carrying two cameras. Albert said it was about a mile or so up to the top. (NO PROBLEM!) While working on the history

of the Herald's and Turner's, we became aware that one impor-

tant groups of these people were called "The Left Hand Hollow Herald's" of Tumer's Creek. Access to the rock can be from the old Herald homestead or Hall homestead. Albert decided to lead us up the trail from the old homeplace of Grandsir William Mack Hall.

So off we set. The combined age among us three was at least 170 years plus! But Albert said it was only a mile or so...

We got the 'Royal Tour.' Albert pointed out the sheep shelters, the opposite hills where the caule were grazed, and the hog cliffs. He showed us where huge groves of hazelnuts used to grow wild before a blight killed off most of them. We passed through the original orchard and garden arcas, where Albert plowed with his old, grey, three - shoed mule. Then we began up the creek and saw where they grew corn and cotton on the steep hillsides. We kept going and going and going, (just like the batteries). We finally arrived up to the site of Grandsir Mack Hall's moonshine still. That's right. His still. Grandsir was a very enterprising many you see. He had a corn grist mill and used up everything. So we got the story on where they buried the warm kegs completely covered and other details.

We photographed several, as yet, unidentified plant life forms. By this time, Albert is beginning to have to slow up and let me rest. He said... "Take your time, we're in no hurry."

Surcly we are close now aren't we, I ask. We keep going. Albert says you just grab a hold of the small trees and pull yourself up the hillside. Straight up. Seventy degrees? NOT. More like

90 degrees. I remember coming down the mountain was along slide in one place. The picture makes me look like I'm standing up straight saying.. "look ma! no hands!", while I'm really sliding flat on my back down the mountain.

Soon, I realize the air is getting thinner and I'm having to bend over to breathe. Not much further Albert says. He asks several times if I want to turn back. So a new poem was soon born:

"Are you kidding I say -- I'm a Tumer's Creek Herald, Tumer, and Hall.

I'll get to the top if I have to crawl!" And crawl it nearly was - for at one point I was on my hands and knees 'just resting', ha!

It didn't seem like a long time... it was a very long time. But the, the skies wer getting closer and another plateau was in site. It must be the top! Not yet, Albert says - just a little bit further. (Crawl, crawl). I already knew

the scenery in these mountains was breathtaking, but how much so I just did not realize! But, I could not lie down very long because it had been usually warm and the snakes were starting to stir up here. However, I did see the most beautiful areas of moss covered ground that it was a tempting thought.

Everything was beginning to bloom. The harder we breathed, the more we took in. Spring, in all her glory, was in bloom. She had got all dressed up and was showing off for us in the bright sun under the baby bluest skies possible!

Albert said all the people came to Buzzard Rock in the summers, in spite of the briars and snakes. It was a place where the ridges from several areas all came together, making it the best place for everyone to come. They

would have church meetings, eat, dance or play music, socialize, and just be 'cool'. And yes, when all the older generations came there, 40 - 60 years and more ago, the road was still up there. Albert said the road was being last used about forty years ago but since then, the land had been changed by logging. Our families had been going there since about 1820. You can still see the stains on the rocks from the buzzard droppings. In those days, it was the roosting and nesting place of large numbers of buzzards, who gathered at the highest point in the deep growth forest...thus, the name: "Buzzard's Rock."

When seeing this place, some may not be as impressed as if they were seeing the Grand Canyon. But I've been to the American West and seen the 'Arches' & the 'Grand Canyon'. I've also been to Natural Bridge and 'The Breaks'. But as soon as we cleared the top of the massive cliff formations, the vicw filled us with fresh air and I gasped at the scene out in all directions. Standing where the ridges all came together, Spring was present everywhere.

The trees presented colors of various purples of reds contrasted against the blue, blue sky and the buff and grey rock formations. Suddenly, I forgot about not being able to hardly breathe.

I quickly was prone on top of the cliff, taking close - ups of the buds on the upper most branches and the moss on the stones. But... it was more than the beauty and the air and being on top of the world euphoria. I sensed we were walking and sitting where our forefathers for generations had been. I then knew this place was very special. They valued this land a great deal more than we do. It gave them everything. It brought back to me a sense of home and appreciation for this land. I hope it isn't too late -- this place could and should be a place for all the people to come here again and breathe in the beauty and serenity. It is a place that deserves loving and preserving.

It was almost dusk when our four & one - half hour pilgrimmage ended. We brought back two real artifacts. A hummingbird's nest and an intact, rusted #7 Mountain Jack plow. I hope that future generations will come to love and preserve this very special place.
