No 12,979 dated the 21st day of July A.D. 1819

Anno 6th said James Clarke do solemnly
swear that I was a resident citizen of the United
States on the 18th day of March 1818. and

that I have not caused that they by gift shall or in any
manner dispossess of my property or any part thereof
with intent so to disseize it as to bring myself within
the provisions of the act of Congress entitled an
Act to provide for certain Persons engaged
in the land and naval service of the United
States in the Revolutionary War, passed on the
18th day of March 1818 and that I have
not nor have any Person in trust for me any
Property or securities, Contracts or acts due
to me nor have any income other than what
is contained in the schedule hereto
or assessed and by my assembly viz.

And that said James Lanning further states upon
his oath, that his occupation is Shoemaking, at which he
is very frequently unable to work by reason of his in-
firmities, being nearly afflicted with a disease. That his
wife Eleanor is yet nearly sixty years of age.
That he is father of five children, namely, ~~but two~~
all married to others; and all poor. I have this
subscribed and declared, before me William L. Kelly,
Presiding Judge of the court aforesaid, the
day of year aforesaid.
