Clark aged about Sixty ^{years} ~~three years~~, ^{as he believes} resident
in Casey county in said state, who being
duly sworn by me, according to law, doth

on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provision made by

the late act of congress, intitled ~~an act~~
to provide for certain persons engaged in

the land & naval service of the U. S.

in the Revolutionary war: That he the

said Clark enlisted in Orange county, State

of Virginia, in the company commanded by

Capt. Thomas Porter the 1st September

was transferred to Capt. Garland Burdick's company

shortly after Burgoyne's defeat & capture,

common law James Clarke

aged about sixty one or two years, personally

appeared in Court and being first duly sworn

according to law, hath on his oath declared

that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows

viz—three years that he enlisted in Orange County
Virginia in the company commanded by Captain Dan
Lyle, in the Regiment commanded by Col. Francis Taylor
in the Virginia line upon the Continental establish-
ment

as will more fully appear by the affidavit under
which he obtained his certificate for a Pension
No 12,979 dated the 21st day of July A.D. 1819

And the said James Clarke do solemnly
swear that he was a resident citizen of the United
States on the 18th day of March 1818. and

that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent to diminish it or to bring myself within the provisions of the Act of Congress, entitled "an Act to provide for certain certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1878 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any interest other than what is contained in the schedule below hereto annexed and by me subscribed viz.
