Original Claim

District of Kentucky, Jr.

On this twenty-fifth day of November 1821, personally appeared in open court being a court of record for the county of Casey and his  
testi apesaid Jacob Coffman aged fifty years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in  
order to obtain the provision made by the act of Congress, of the 18<sup>th</sup>  
March 1818, and 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820, that he the said Jacob Coffman enlisted  
for the term of three years on the first day of April in the year 1777  
in the state of Maryland in the company commanded by Capt. Bolle in  
the <sup>2<sup>nd</sup> regiment commanded by Col. Meltzer in the line of the state of Maryland  
on the continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the  
said corps until the expiration of three years, at which time he again  
enlisted in the same corps under the same Capt. and Col. and in the  
same regiment and line, and that he continued to serve ~~until~~ after the win-  
ter of 1782 when he was taken prisoner at <sup>Spring</sup> in south Carolina  
with the enemy under Capt. Bolle, but as Col. Meltzer has resigned the  
regiment was commanded by Col. John Stewart.</sup>

That he was in the battle of Monmouth in the Jersey, the battle  
of Shemong, the battle of New town Point and the skirmish at the ~~Utaw~~  
~~in South Carolina~~ battle at Little York when Wallace was taken as  
also the skirmish at the Utaw in South Carolina when he was taken  
prisoner; and that he has no other evidence, now in his power.

And in pursuance of the act of the 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820 I do solemnly  
swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I  
have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed  
of my property, or any part thereof withoutent thereby so to diminish  
it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress  
entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the late  
Revolutionary war" kept

swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I  
have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed  
of my property, or any part thereof without intent thereby so to diminish  
it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress  
entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land  
and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war" passed  
on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen; &  
that I have not now nor has any person in trust for me, any property  
or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income  
other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by  
me subscribed. Viz:

On thirtieth day of December in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty three personally appeared before the County Court of Casey County held in aid for said County in open Court Mrs Chloe Coffman a resident of Casey County and State of Kentucky aged fifty eight years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the law of the United States passed the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of February 1853 granting pensions to the widows of persons who served in the war of the Revolution

That she is the widow of Jacob Coffman who was a private in said War, and a pensioner of the United States at the rate of \$96. per annum which he received semi-annually at the agency at Lexington Ky.

She further declares that she was married to the said Jacob Coffman on the twenty fourth day of December Eighteen hundred and Twenty Six that her said husband died on the 2<sup>d</sup> day of June eighteen hundred and Forty that she was not married to him prior to the second day of January eighteen hundred but at the time above stated. That there is a public Record of her marriage in the Casey County Clerk's Office a copy of which is filed herewith. She further declares that she is still a widow.

On this 21 day of April 1856 A.D. One thousand and eight hundred and fifty five years past, appears before the undersigned a Justice of the Peace for the said County of Beasay and State of Kentucky Mrs Rebekah Coffman aged 75 years a resident of Beasay County in the State of Kentucky who being duly sworn according to law declares that she is the identical Rebekah Coffman the widow of Jacob Coffman deceased who was a private in the War of the Revolution and to whom for the services of her said husband in said Revolutionary War a pension was granted by Henry Six Dollars per annum commencing on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of February 1803 and continuing for life, until she should again marry. That she was married to said Jacob Coffman in Beasay County Kentucky on or about the 1<sup>st</sup> day of Nov 1826 A.D. and that her marriage before her marriage was Rebekah Richards that her said husband died in Beasay County Kentucky on or about the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of June 1840 A.D. and that she is now a widow, and a resident of Beasay County at the time of executing this her declaration. She refers to her said declaration for Pension and to the muster rolls and other ~~other~~ documents of record for the proper evidence of his services and of his marriage files in the proper office of Washington She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Bounty Land to which she may be entitled under the acts of Congress approved March 3. 1855. She declares that she has never received ~~any~~ applied for Bounty Land under acts of Congress except this application.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request Revolutionary War data relative to Jacob Coffman and William Dodson, both pensioned on account of their service in the Revolutionary War.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 6943, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Jacob Coffman.

He enlisted in Maryland, April 1, 1777 and served in Captain Baltzel's company in Colonel Welter's German Regiment, was in the battles of Monmouth, Chemung, Newtown Point, was taken prisoner at Eutaw Springs, South Carolina (it is not stated when released from prison) was in the battle of Yorktown when Cornwallis surrendered, he was then commanded by Colonel John Stewart, and served until the winter of 1782.

He was allowed pension on his application executed November 26, 1821, then aged sixty years and living in Casey County, Kentucky.

He died June 2, 1840 in Casey County, Kentucky. The date and place of his birth are not given nor are the names of his parents shown.

Jacob Coffman married, December 24, 1826 in Casey County, Kentucky, Chloe Richards.

She was allowed pension on her application exe-

cuted December 12, 1853, then aged fifty-eight years  
and living in Casey County, Kentucky.

It is not stated whether they had children.

One Frederic Coffman was living in 1855 in Casey  
County, Kentucky, no relationship to family shown.

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The data which follow were obtained from the  
papers on file in pension claim, S. 30994, based upon the  
the Revolutionary War service of William Dodson.

He was born March 29, 1768 in Shenandoah County,  
Virginia, the names of his parents are not given.

While residing in Shenandoah County, he enlisted  
in February, 1776 and served in Captain Richard Camp-  
bell's company in Colonels Muhlenburg's and Bowman's  
Eighth Virginia Regiment, was in the battles of Bran-  
dywine, Germantown and wintered at Valley Forge, length  
of service two years and two months.

He was allowed pension on his application exe-  
cuted January 14, 1833, then a resident of Nelson County,  
Kentucky.

There are no data as to his family.
