Adair County 3<sup>rd</sup>

On this 5<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832 personally appeared in open court before the judge of the Adair Circuit Court now sitting John Gooden a resident of Adair County State of Kentucky aged 83 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1809.

That he entered the service of the United States under Capt Anthony Winston in year 1779 in Buckingham County Virginia where he then lived. He then marched through the Counties of Chesterfield & Linsfordie (State of Virginia) and to Cabin point and was stationed at said Cabin point about ~~two~~<sup>three</sup> months the time for which he was drafted. He was in no engagements with the enemy during this campaign.

He received his discharge from Col Allen who was Commander of the Regiment the No. of which is not recollectec Major Jones was Commander under Col. Allen. He states that he lost his discharge from this tour in James River as he was exposing it in a canoe.

He further states that he again entered the service under Capt Bohannon in in the Regiment Commanded by Col Taylor. in June 1781 he then marched from Buckingham County to Alleghany and was stationed at the mouth of Rockfish in said last mentioned County about six months. He was put at the mouth of Rockfish River on James River for the purpose of guarding the Ferry and ferrying the provissons wagges of the army across which were coming to and returning from the Army constantly - He states that a few weeks after the Surrender of Cornwallis in Oct 1781. the provissons arms and all the implements of war that were at the mouth of Rockfish were carried down to Richmond by water and then went down with two loads of them that after he had finished transported the transportation of every thing belonging to the Army from the mouth of Rockfish to Richmond that he received his discharge from Col. Taylor & returned to his residence in Buckingham County Virginia.

He states this last discharge received in Decr 1789 his also lost. He states that he has no record of his age. That since the Revolutionary war he lived in Virginia until the year 1774 at which time he removed to Lincoln City Kentucky where he lived about 8 or 9 years and has lived ever since in the County of Adair where he now resides. He states that he has no documentary evidence. That he knows of no person now living in Kentucky whom he can procure to testify to his services.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state -

And the said Agent do hereby declare their opinion, after the investigation of the matter, and after putting the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department, that the above-named applicant was a revolutionary soldier and served as he states. And the Court further certifies, that it appears to them that Henry Winfrey who has signed the preceding certificate is a Clergyman, is a resident in the County of <sup>Logan</sup> Logan and that Fleming Goodale

Dear Sir:

The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in Revolutionary War pension claim, S.30443, based upon the military service of John Goods in that war.

John Goods was born in 1750, in Henrico County, Virginia. The names of his parents are not shown.

While residing in Buckingham County, Virginia, John Goods enlisted sometime in 1779, exact date not stated, and served three months as a private in Captain Anthony Winslow's Company, Colonel Allen's Virginia Regiment; he enlisted in June, 1781, and served six months as a private in Captain Johnson's Company, Colonel Taylor's Virginia Regiment and was stationed on the James River at the mouth of Rockfish River, in Albemarle County, Virginia, and guarded the ferry at that point.

In 1794, he moved to Lincoln County, Kentucky, where he lived for eight or nine years, then moved to Adair County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1833, while residing in Adair County, Kentucky.

He died March 11, 1840, place not shown.

Soldier's widow is referred to; her name and the date of their marriage are not shown and there is no reference to children.

In 1822, one Fleming Goods was a resident of Adair County, Kentucky; no relationship to the soldier was shown and there are no further family data.
