Letter to Hon. Garrett Davis 26 Dec. 1842

State of Kentucky, 12th Judicial
District, Casey County, etc.

Be it remembered, that on the
16th day of August in the year 1822, in the
said court for the county & District
above mentioned, the being a court of Record
by act of the Legislature of the state above-
named, proceeding according to the course
of the common law of which the honora-
ble John L. Bridges is now presiding Judge,
& personally appeared Jacob Knealy,
of the county of Casey, aged about sixty
years, who is the applicant for a pen-
sion under the act of Congress passed in
September 1818, in which he stated in
his affidavit & declaration of his affidavit
made in the circuit court of Lincoln
county in the year 1818 at the August term
that during the Revolution of the
year 1776 in the state of Maryland, he
enlisted as a regular soldier in the service
of the United States in the war against
Great Britain, upon the continental esta-
blishment, that he enlisted under Capt.
Henry Tate, who resigned in a very short
time & he was attached to the company
commanded by Captain Henry Rachel
said company formed a part of
Major Beards Battalion which was one
of the several Maryland Regiments

commanded by Col. Walden of the
drisk-town, that he was marched
from the place of enlistment to Phil-
adelphia, where he remained in Barracks
for three or four months, from whence
he was marched through Jersey to the
White Plains & was marched to various
points until the battle at Monmouth
countenance at which place he wintered,
that he wintered the next winter at
Easton on the Delaware river, from whence
he was marched to Wyoming on the Sus-
quehanna & joined the troops commanded by
General Sullivan, with whom he marched
up the Susquehanna against the Indians, and
fought with them at Red Bank point, from
whence he was marched back to Wyoming
& from thence to Northumberland where
he was wintered, from whence he was
marched to Fort Mifflin, thence to
Northumberland, from thence to Fort Ju-
ber, at which place he remained until
the expiration of his term of service, which
term he served out faithfully & was dis-
charged, but his discharge by inci-
dent. That he is now injured, poor &
reduced in his circumstances & needs the
aid of Congress & has & does now claim the
same.
He states further that he is now
& never has been since the time of his enlist-

 he has not at any time made any gift,

and pensions to certain widows: That she is the widow of Jacob
Hefley who was a soldier in the revolution and a pensioner on the

to the said Jacob Hefley in the month of October Seventeen hundred

Sir:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, U.8902, it appears that Jacob Havely, Hefley or Haeeligha enlisted in Thomas Creek Settlement, Frederick County, Maryland, in 1777, and served three years in Captains Keybert's (?) and Baltzel's Companies, ^{Kerman Battalion} Colonel Veltner's Maryland Regiment and was in the battles of Monmouth and Red Bank.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 11, 1838.

In 1822, he was living in Casey County, Kentucky, . . . aged sixty-four years. Hed

He died December 22, 1833.

The soldier married in October, 1783, in Fredericktown, Maryland, Elizabeth, her maiden name is not given. She was allowed pension on her application executed October 18, 1838, at which time she was living in Casey County,

Kentucky, aged sixty-nine years.

The following ^{were} are their children:

John, the oldest, was fifty years of age in 1839;
~~Samuel~~, married ---- Starns, and was living in Casey
County, Kentucky, in 1838, aged forty-seven years; Rhody,
married ~~Abel~~ Ellis, and was forty-five or forty-six years
of age in 1839; Frederick was forty-three or forty-four
years of age in 1839; Mary, married ---- Russell, and was
forty-two years of age in 1839; Jacob was forty years of
age in 1839; George and Henry, twins, were aged about
thirty-two years in 1839; Catharine was thirty-four years
of age in 1839; son George married a daughter of Joseph
Good, her maiden name is not stated.

There are no further data as to family.
