doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit

of the provision made by the act of Congress passed 1st July 1830 to enable all
men to sell their and Prodious to certain persons, knowt that she is the widow of Mill
Fullerton deceased late of Clay County Kentucky now who was a soldier in
the Army of Revolution and served as a Private several years and who
went to the Troops of the State of Virginia and an account of his service
since was granted a pension under the act of Congress passed the 1st day
of June 1832 at the rate of \$60.00 per annum. She being unable to
state the names of the officers over whom the said pension is the sum
of her husband was performed will for their names as well
as the character of the service the duration the term at which he
was in the service contained in the papers comprising the matter of
her application for the pension. She further deelans
that her husband may have served in other Regts or other Troops as
she did not become acquainted with him her said husband until after
his service in the army had terminated up to the time he has been
done well nfor to the source upon which said Pension was granted
her for a full history of the various places whereat she has further
deelans that she has no documentary evidence in support of her
claims. She further deelans that she was married to the

On the 19th day of April 1833 personally appeared before
me James Burkman Justice of the peace, and one of the
Delegates of the County Court of Court in the State of Illinois
another man aged about forty five years old who being but
of common education and unable to make the
true recitation in order to obtain the benefit of the
statute of limitations; proceeded the 7th 1832
to file his complaint.

that we enlisted as a regular soldier under Capt
John Campbell at Aug 1st 1776 in the State of New York in the
year 1776 in Captain's collect the regt was commanded by Gen
Wm. Clinton & his staff and the army commanded by Gen
Gen. George Washington and was a very short time afterwards
they crossed the Hudson at New York called Glens Falls, and
the soldiers became Heath, The conflict here was very
short and soon they were sent without their arms
across the river to the fort at Ticonderoga to be
guard of the enemy. This was my first encounter with
the enemy as they were then called, we often got into
the army under the command of Gen. Washington and
near the village where we camped there and the
troops and here was surely controlled the fort like all the others
here but it was believed by all of us that we got this last
meeting but it was commanded by Capt. John Campbell
of the 7th. In this field we were shortly commanded
by Gen. J. Mc Gregor who thanks Washington was com-
manded in this field we afterwards camped at Fort Rum-
ney and took a long hard road to collect the men of the
army and were collected in to General's camp at the Island.
and here we were collected during the whole we suffered
severely. It was bitter cold weather and the great
losses of the soldiers who had left the army but
most of the sick and disabled left the army but
died after wards and reinforcements were received
from the Garrison and took the Indians at Ticonderoga
and most of them prisoners we then

was to General Brown and connected with a body
of the enemy defeated them and took several hundred
prisoners in. In this went into Master Gunners at Monmouth
during which time he suffered for want of, Warmfrogs
and Clothing as well as the report made after
the battle like we heard for 100 and by some and
had a brother killed it was hot weather and we
had a hot time in the battle he was wounded in
the left leg a little later when the ball entered
the right side of the hip and lodged just to the skin on
the right side, they were forced to retreat, and the
next morning the fugitives cut out the ball
and it was able to keep his place in the ranks. He kept
alive and fought in the Battles of Germantown and
the Thermesky the year it went into winter quarters
at a place called Sibley's Ford, in Themsky it was reported
for him to further connect his services he was one of
the last to enter one of his last to quit the
army he has no doubt but that his name will be found
in the roll of the Confederates going from Maryland
he has done nothing but the honest at the time of his
retirement to the war, sumptuous land sales which he has
done and which he now wishes to get - he has by
him self very clear what we're to a Union or
Confederacy except the present, and he declares that his
name is not on the American Roll of any agency
in any State - he would be bound the day and
year past and make further more swear that he
knows of no persons being so known in connection
with or near to him from reputation that he has
long since lost or mislaid his discharge and he prof
he refers to the old roll and to those who know him best
and longest and that he is unable to afford the least value of proof of
his former rank or of his name
